What does service mean as an AA member? What does it mean in my Sobriety? I recall the first time I heard the term and what it meant. It meant volunteering my time to chair a meeting, make a pot of coffee, or greet members at the door. It meant keeping a safe space open, to carry our message of hope. It means giving the message away freely, the way it was given to me.

I cringed on the first day of my chairing commitment; I was around 6 months sober. This meeting is in the Bronx, predominant members being long timers. A mix of people I would normally not mingle with because of how diverse we are. Of course, at first, I said, "I'm not doing this". Then I heard, "if you want what we have, you do what we do". And I so badly wanted the vast years of sobriety these members had. Today, I am aware of what service is and what it does. It keeps me out of my head, quiets the committee in my mind, and most of all, I help someone else.

We come from diverse spectrums of life, however, fight a

common denominator- alcoholism. With service we get to show up for ourselves and others. It makes us Service Warriors without even knowing. We come into this Fellowship unaware of what to expect and end up with a toolbox that helps us deal with life, such as service.

I have been able to do service below the group level with events such as LISTS, Share a Day, and Queens Gratitude Day. This has provided me with an opportunity to work with other Trusted Servants from Intergroup and General Service. I have been able to include my son in these events, showing him what humility looks like and that we can recover. I am blessed to be part of a home group that is big on service because to me, it's about the attraction and practicing of all 36 Principles in all my affairs.

A Diverse Spectrum of Service Warriors

Why are we talking about diversity in an AA newsletter? Isn't that an outside issue? Well, no. AA is made up of "people who normally would not mix." (Alcoholics Anonymous, p. 17) Diversity in service benefits AA for the basic reason that more diversity in service means more AA members' viewpoints being represented.

In tradition 2, it tells us that we want to strive to have an informed group conscience. We want everyone represented in that group conscience. Our viewpoints are usually shaped by our life experience. Someone from rural NY may have a differing viewpoint than someone from urban NY. A young person may have a differing viewpoint than an older person. A transgender person may have a differing viewpoint than a cisgender person. The same applies to people in different social classes or with different incomes, people with different sexual orientations, people of different races and ethnicities, different religions, different cultures, etc. Each group represents different life experiences

united by the same thing: the program of Alcoholics Anonymous. In service, we all unite to do what we think is best for AA; to help it thrive and reach the most alcoholics out there. Like mentioned, the best for AA can only be achieved through one method — the informed group conscience.

We are part of a wonderful program that values the individual deeply. It is so beautiful that, no matter if you're the majority or the minority, we want to hear what you have to say. It is the only way to properly reach a group conscience. It is only through the informed group conscience that we can lay aside our personal differences and put the unity of AA first. 
Writing the Big Book, by William H. Schaberg


We read the chapter in advance & discuss at the book club meeting. A weekly schedule of the chapters can be found on brooklynaa.org."


The book club runs for 31 weeks from July 16, 2023 to March 10, 2024, but will be off for holidays on September 3, November 26, December 24, and December 31.
