A Word From Our SENY Delegate - Panel 71

Hello, Members and Friends. As I contemplated "What is Freedom in AA" (The Language of the Heart, page 300), I thought back to one of the first riddles I heard in the rooms, as a dry drunk in early 2007. *Q. What's the spiritual part of Alcoholics Anonymous? A. All of it!* I didn't get it. As I read on, I also considered those powerful words in Appendix II in Alcoholics Anonymous, all in italics: "Willingness, honesty and open mindedness are the essentials of recovery. But these are indispensable."

As I reflected on one particular aspect of the spiritual journey Bill W. laid out in this essay (from "must," to "ought to," to "want to") it made me think, yet again, about the profound gift of inner peace I've been given by our program of recovery. Not peace like in a Tibetan monastery; rather peace with who I've become, and what my purpose is in this life.

And that led me to think about our Fellowship's challenges and changes over the past several years, compounded by the seemingly endless pandemic through which we've all struggled. For myself, it's been difficult to feel

free in a environment of restrictions; it's often been hard to embrace spirituality when looking at a computer screen where I don't know if many of the "attendees" are even there; and it's certainly not easy for me that the term "normal" has to be far more flexible than I ever thought possible.

I think I'll make my way through these evolutions, and perhaps even come out stronger on the other side – even though, as my friend and mentor John W. says, "alcoholics hate two things: the way things are, and change." As long as I'm doing 12th Step work and service, and "practice these principles in all [my] affairs," I've got a pretty good chance to stay sober and spiritually free.

Between the time I write this and the time you read this, the 72nd General Service Conference will have taken place. Like all the other Conferences before us, we will have done our best to act in love, make decisions that serve Alcoholics Anonymous in the best way possible, and report it all back to you. Because it goes beyond Advisory Actions and Final Conference Reports: it's about Freedom, for you and for me. Thank you for the gift of serving you.

Freedom in AA

I equate the beginning of my journey in AA to my childhood, when I really wanted to fit in with the other kids. Although I felt like I was at home when I stepped into my first AA meeting; I was afraid the members would not accept me. I raised my hand and said I was an alcoholic, but I found out later that I was not entirely honest. Even though I heard the message in the detox and was able to identify; I think I still had reservations. Weeks later, I was sitting waiting for a meeting to start. When the meeting opened, the chairperson invited those counting days to raise their hands. Just like at so many other meetings during my first ninety days I raised my hand, said my name, and announced I was an alcoholic. Afterward, a feeling came over me and I started crying. That was the first time I felt freedom in AA. A freedom from the bondage of

alcohol. From that point forward, I knew I was an alcoholic that could no longer drink safely. The burden of compulsion and obsession for alcohol was lifted, and I had my first spiritual awakening.

Continuing in the program, I took many of the suggestions given which I was told were beneficial for newcomers. I was also told; the suggestions you do not take you may suffer from. Like a fearful child I tried to obey and not be rebellious since I did not feel grown up yet. I would sit in meetings and read the slogans and the shades. I am grateful our Traditions use suggestive words like "ought" and "should." The only "must" is in the long form of Tradition One; "AA must continue to live or most of us will surely die." As I continue my journey, I find when I choose to do what I ought to and instead of what I want to, I am choosing the path that is best for me. There is freedom in surrendering to God's will for me and in doing so, I open myself to growth in sobriety and spirituality.


