Finding My Voice in the **Group Conscience and Carrying Yours**

Before I ever thought about service beyond my home group, before I understood the structure of A.A. at all, I had a moment that stayed with me.

The first time I really felt the meaning of an informed group conscience was at my home group.

I remember bringing an idea forward and feeling the nervousness of speaking up. I watched as the group listened, discussed, weighed the idea, and voted. When the vote came down, something shifted in me. I wasn't just attending a meeting anymore. I was a part of something. I had a voice inside it.

That was the first time I truly understood the spirit behind A.A.'s upside-down triangle, where ultimate authority rests not with leaders, but with the groups themselves.

Now, as a Delegate preparing to attend my first General Service Conference, I carry that same

feeling with me. Preparing for the Conference has been a trip. It hasn't just been about reading background or attending meetings. It has been about listening closely, discerning what principles are at stake, and thinking critically about what best serves A.A. as a whole.

Some moments asked me to weigh emotional reactions against A.A.'s long-term needs. At other times, it meant recognizing when a passionate argument might cloud the clarity of a principle. It meant remembering that "right" and "popular" are not always the same and that my job is to serve spiritual principles, not applause.

Reading nearly 300 responses to the Delegate's Questionnaire, I saw clearly that an informed group conscience isn't about getting unanimous answers. It's about creating space for real, sometimes messy, principled participation. Some responses showed strong consensus. Others revealed the deep care and complexity our members bring to questions about A.A.'s future. Every voice added weight and shape to the conscience I now carry forward. I am deeply grateful to all the groups that participated in this process.

As I move toward Conference week, I carry those voices with deep respect. Being an informed



When I was DCM for District 301, a GSR from one of our district's groups joined the meeting. When we announced the 7th Tradition, he inquired where the money went. Well, I answered his question and said that it goes towards rent, and hopefully towards workshops, too. But inwardly, I was thinking, who is this guy (and a little more than that). As my ego calmed down and several district members spoke about this question, "Where does the 7th Tradition go?" we knew we had to develop written district conscience guidelines. This moment was a spiritual awakening in my sober service journey. Our newly active district needed many voices to grow and unify. And we, as trusted servants, needed to listen. What a gift!

Thank God for Alcoholics Anonymous and our guiding principles.

From the Archives: Notable May Dates in A.A. History



May 11, 1935

Bill was at the Mayflower Hotel, near relapse, and through a series of phone calls and referrals for the Cleveland Indians, gave a press was connected with Dr. Bob.

May 12, 1935

Dr. Bob and Bill met in Akron for the first time.

May 1938

Beginning of writing of the book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*

May 6, 1939

Clarence S. of Cleveland tells Dr. Bob, his sponsor, he would not be back to Oxford Group meetings in Akron and would start an A.A. meeting in Cleveland.

May 1939

First group to officially call itself Alcoholics Anonymous met at Abby G.'s house in Cleveland.

May 1939

Lois's Home Replacement Fund started at Alcoholic Foundation.

May 1, 1940

Rollie H., a popular baseball player and catcher for the Cleveland Indians, gave a press conference and announced his association with A.A. He's the first A.A. member to break his anonymity on the national level.

May 6, 1946

The long form of the Twelve Traditions was published in *The Grapevine*.

May 1950

Nell Wing became Bill W.'s secretary. She was also A.A.'s first archivist.

May 1951

Al-Anon was founded by Lois W. and Anne B.

May 29, 1980

Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers was published.

May 19, 2000

Dr. Paul O., author of the Big Book story "Doctor, Alcoholic, Addict" (renamed "Acceptance Was the Answer" in the 4th edition), died at the age of 83.

Here are the answers to the two trivia questions that appeared in the April issue of *The Link*:

What is Swedenborgianism?

Swedenborgianism is the system of philosophical and religious doctrines of Emanuel Swedenborg, an 18th-century Swedish theologian and scientist. (Perhaps the most famous adherent of Swedenborgianism in America was Helen Keller.) Lois's family belonged to the Swedenborgian Church. Bill and Lois were married in a Swedenborgian ceremony in Brooklyn Heights in 1918.

In what New York City Cathedral was Bill W.'s funeral Mass held on February 14, 1971?
The Cathedral of St. John the Divine (located in the Morningside Heights neighborhood of Manhattan at 1047 Amsterdam Avenue)




